

HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE

Holy Cross College (Autonomous), Nagercoil is a Catholic College established and administered by the Congregation of the Sisters of the Cross of Chavanod. The college is under the religious jurisdiction of the Catholic Bishop of Kottar.

Holy Cross College, the first Women's College in Kanyakumari District was inaugurated on 2nd August, 1965. The college campus has an area of about 20 acres with large playgrounds and buildings.

Most Rev. Dr. Roch Agniswamy identified the urgent need to have an exclusive women's college in Kanyakumari District and in response to the proposal the then Superior General Rev. Mother Yvonne Lavorel (France) responded positively and Rev. Mother Marie Cecile Vionnet, the then Provincial of Trichy along with her dedicated band of sisters, established this great institution despite severe financial constraints and other heavy odds.

The College was first affiliated to Madras University and it started with the Pre University Course (PUC) which offered the following subjects.

Part I - English

Part II - Tamil, Malayalam and French
PartIII - Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry.
Physics, Chemistry, Biology.

History, Economics, Advanced Languages.

The College was raised to a first grade college in 1966 and was affiliated to the Madurai Kamaraj University, offering undergraduate courses in Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, History, Economics, Commerce and English and Post graduate (PG) courses in Mathematics, Physics, Zoology and English. Since 1990, the college is affiliated to Manonmaniam Sundaranar University, Tirunelveli.

The College was conferred Autonomous status in 2007 and Extension of Autonomy was granted in November 2016. The college has undergone four cycles of accreditation by National Assessment and Accreditation Council. In the fourth cycle the college is awarded 'A+' grade with CGPA 3.35.

ATTRIBUTES OF THE GRADUATES

Graduates of our College develop the following attributes during the course of their studies.

Creative thinking: Equipping students with hands-on-training through skill based courses and promote startup.

Personality development: Coping with increasing pace and change of modern life through value education, awareness on human rights, gender issues and giving counselling for the needful.

Environmental consciousness and social understanding: Reflecting upon green initiatives and understanding the responsibility to contribute to the society; promoting social and cultural diversity through student training and service learning programmes.

Communicative competence: Offering effective communication skills in both professional and social contexts through bridge courses and activities of clubs and committees.

Aesthetic skills: Engaging mind, body and emotions for transformation through finearts, meditation and exercise; enriching skills through certificate courses offered by Holy Cross Academy.

Research and knowledge enrichment: Getting in-depth knowledge in the specific area of study through relevant core papers; ability to create new understanding through the process of critical analysis and problem solving.

Professional ethics: Valuing honesty, fairness, respect, compassion and professional ethics among students. The students of social work adhere to the *National Association of Social Workers Code of Ethics*.

Student Engagement in the learning process: Obtaining extensive and varied opportunities to utilize and build upon the theoretical and empirical knowledge gained through workshops, seminars, conferences, industrial visits and summer internship programmes.

Employability: Enhancing students in their professional life through Crossian Centre for Entrepreneurship and Career guidance.

Women empowerment and leadership: Developing the capacity of self-management, teamwork, leadership and decision making through gender sensitization programmes.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR STUDENTS

The reputation of the college is in the hands of the staff and students, whether they are on or off the premises. The institution has utmost faith in its staff and students and in their desire to uphold its standard.

- O The academic year is divided into two semesters. If a student leaves the college during the first semester before 31st August, she shall have no right to claim a remission of any portion of the fee except the tuition fee.
- O The semester fee should be paid by the students within ten working days from the date of re-opening.
- Wearing the ID is mandatory for all the students.
- O Loss of Identity card should be reported immediately and duplicate will be issued by the college on requisition letter to the principal and on payment of the prescribed amount.
- The students are expected to assemble in the classroom immediately after the first bell.
- O The students are not permitted to leave the college during the working hours, in case of emergency they have to get permission and a gate pass from the Principal/Head of the Department.
- O The day is given a start with a devotional song played through the public address system, followed by a short prayer. All the staff and students are expected to keep standing during this time, whether they are inside or outside the classroom.



- O The students are not permitted to give interviews in radio/ TV without prior permission from the principal.
- O The students are expected to move quickly and quietly while moving from one class to another. They are not permitted to visit the canteen during class hours. While walking they must keep to the right along the corridors, in the staircases and on the road.
- O The students are expected to read the information on the college notice board and the department notice board regularly. Ignorance of any such information will not be accepted as an excuse for failing to comply with it.
- O The Students have to enter and leave the Multipurpose Hall through the side doors only. During college meetings, the students have to show respect to the dignitaries on the stage by standing until they take their place on the dais. No one should leave the hall during the meetings or show noisy approval or disapproval. They should avoid carrying books or eatables to the hall.
- O The students should accord respect and greet the staff whenever they happen to meet them.
- O The students must be always courteous in their words and deeds. If any article is lost or found in the college campus, they shall report the matter to the college office.
- O The students should consider college property as their own and cause no wilful damage. They should not pluck fruits from trees, as they are leased out. They should not write or make any mark on the walls, desks or in any part of the college premises or litter the campus with papers, sweet wrappers and plastic bags. They must take pride in keeping the campus clean.
- O Disobedience, irregular attendance, malpractices in examinations, habitual carelessness, bad conduct and manners and non-observance of the rules of the college shall lead to strong disciplinary action which may entail dismissal from the college.

- O Regularity and punctuality for classes and tests are very essential. Absentees for Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) test will be penalized.
- O The students should dress neatly and decently. Modesty in dressing is highly emphasized in the college. Students should wear uniform on all working days. On permitted days, students can wear only sarees / chudithar.
- O T-shirts/ jeans pant and sleeveless attire are not permitted.
- O The staff and the students should not collect money without prior permission from the Principal and the Head of the Department concerned.
- O The students should remember that wherever they are, they represent the college and honour it by their behaviour.
- O The students are not permitted to post negative statements about the college / staff / students on social media website.
- O Ragging is totally banned in the institution. Any act of ragging is liable for appropriate punishment.
- O The students are permitted to bring laptop to the college. Laptops can be used during class hours only for academic purposes (seminar, assignment, blended classroom learning and project work).

ATTENDANCE

- O The students should attend the classes regularly. Attendance will be marked at the beginning of each period. If a student is absent for any one period, that half day will be marked as absent. Daily attendance is sent to parents through SMS.
- A student will be permitted to write the semester examinations, only if she has an attendance of atleast 75%. If the attendance is 62% to 74% she has to pay a condonation fee of Rs. 1,000/- and she will be permitted to write the semester examinations. (If the attendance is less than 62% the student will not be permitted to write the semester examination.)

LEAVE OR ABSENCE

- O A student should not absent herself from the class except for valid reasons. She shall apply for leave in advance to the Principal in the prescribed leave form, which may be obtained from the college office. If this is not possible as in the case of sudden illness, leave letter shall be produced on the day, the student returns to the college. The leave form should be counter signed by the parent / guardian and the respective class teachers.
- O If a student absents herself without prior information, her absence will be immediately reported to her parents or to the hostel warden and disciplinary action such as levying fine, suspension etc. will be taken.
- O The students who come late will be permitted to the class only with the permission of the HOD.
- All the scholarship / fee concession holders should earn an attendance of 90% failing which the entire scholarship / fee concession amount has to be refunded to the Government as per G.O.M.S. No. 1537 Social Welfare Dept., Dt. 20.04.1983.
- O The students who represent the college in sports and games, or in competitions, such as fine arts, quiz, elocution etc. or NSS camps are given credit of attendance for the period. It is called leave on Other Duty (OD). They shall fill proper forms meant for OD and get them countersigned by the HOD and submit it to the Principal and Controller of Examinations before they leave the campus. Those who fail to do so will be considered absent.

CERTIFICATES

 Any student, past or present, wishing to obtain a Transfer Certificate (TC) or Conduct Certificate (CC), must apply to the college office in the prescribed form. Certificates will be issued with 48 hours notice. No certificate will be posted unless a stamped self-addressed envelope is submitted together with the application. Those who want the TC should bring one of their parents/guardian.

PETITIONS AND COMPLAINTS

- O Requests, petitions, appeals and complaints of any kind must be made either to the Principal directly or through the suggestion box, which is kept outside the Principal's office. Students are not allowed to make a complaint as a group or to address any authority in a collective petition. Such combined action is subversive of good order.
- O Under the Government's Educational rules, the Principal has full power to inflict punishments such as fine for inadequate attendance and irregularity in the Continuous Internal Assessments (CIA), suspension and expulsion in matters of grave concern.

HOSTEL

- O The students who are not residing with the parents or relations are expected to live in the college hostel. Hostel students will be under the care of the warden and they must abide by the hostel rules.
- O Day scholars should not visit the hostel.

LIBRARY

- It is obligatory for all students of the college to be members of the Library and Reader's Forum.
- O The library will remain open from 8.45 a.m. to 4.15 p.m. on all working days.



- O The students must bring their ID card and Library card while entering the Library. They should not enter with bags, but leave them on the shelf near the circulation desk.
- O The library card is not transferable.
- O The students should maintain strict silence in the Reading Room and other areas of the library.
- After taking a book from the Reading Room shelf, they should get it issued at the circulation desk by submitting the Reading Pass. Before leaving the library the books should be left at the counter.
- O Students will be allowed to take a maximum of 5 books at a time to read in the Reading Room.
- O Newspapers should be handled with care and all the pages should be intact after reading them.
- O Do not misplace the books while looking for the books on the shelves. After selecting the needed books do not shuffle, but keep in proper places.
- O The students have the privilege of direct access to the shelves in the stack room and the reading room. They are requested to respect the freedom and not misuse it.
- O The students should not crowd in front of any counter, but should be in a queue.
- O The students will be given two/five borrower's tickets. When a book is borrowed, a borrower's ticket is to be given at the counter. The ticket will be returned to the borrower when the book is returned. Not more than two books will be issued for the UG students and 5 books for the PG students at a time.
- O Check the condition of the book at the time of borrowing. In case of any mutilation or loss of pages, report instantly to the concerned library staff. Otherwise the borrower will be responsible for the damage.
- A student can keep a book only for a week. The book borrowed should be returned on or before the stipulated

date mentioned on the date-slip. When the prescribed time has elapsed, the book must be returned to the librarian by the student herself.

- O A student failing to return a book within the prescribed time shall pay an overdue charge of one rupee per book per day and she will not be allowed to use the library till the due is paid.
- O Absence from the college shall not be an excuse for any delay in returning the books. Books due on a holiday shall be returned on the next working day and no fine will be levied.
- O The books may be returned on all working days.
- All books must be returned before the end of each semester.
- O No one is allowed to pass on any book to another or lend them to any one inside or outside the college.
- O The librarian will examine all the books returned and if any book is found damaged, the matter will be reported to the Principal at once. If a book is damaged, lost or soiled, the person responsible shall replace it with a new copy of the book.
- O Books should be handled with care. Marking on books is most objectionable. The students are strictly forbidden to tear, cut out or scribble on pages of magazines, periodicals and books. Any student found doing so will be punished severely.
- O Library is a mobile free zone.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR FACULTY

To ensure optimal functioning of any institution an efficient teamwork structured around operational guidelines is mandatory. **Code of conduct for faculty is listed below:**

- O Faculty should adhere to responsible conduct and behaviour.
- Faculty must not violate the laws of the Government/College/local bodies etc.
- Members of faculty are expected to contribute professionally in curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities of the college.

- Faculty must rise beyond all forms of discriminations based on ethinicity, age, religion, caste, creed, colour, nationality, linguistics and disability differences.
- Faculty must be punctual to all the classes, official meetings and learn to meet deadlines with resilience.
- O Faculty should be impartial in teaching and evaluation and should ensure outcome- based learning.
- Every teacher should be considerate and dignified while interacting with the students, colleagues, support staff and management.
- Faculty should update their knowledge and skills and continue their professional growth.
- O Teachers should engagingly design and implement courses that are sensitive to the varying learning needs of the diverse student community.
- Faculty must inculcate respect for the biodiversity and instill ethical values and a sense of self-worth in the students.
- Faculty should extend support, appreciation and constructive criticism to colleagues and avoid unprofessional talk about individuals.
- O Faculty should not involve in any act which will undermine the integrity and reputation of the institution; they are expected to set aside clear boundaries with the students and their parents; and adhere to the highest standard during online and offline communication.
- O Faculty should be ready to take additional responsibilities assigned by the HOD / Principal in academic, co-curricular or extra-curricular activities.
- O Faculty should avoid any activity that would involve stakeholders in any practice that is not in compliance with the Code of Conduct of the Institute.

Code of Conduct for the Non-Teaching Staff

- O Support staff should be adoptable, willing and happy to accept any responsibility assigned to them.
- O Non- teaching staff must start the work on time.

(ii) Degree:

The candidates shall have subsequently undergone the prescribed course of study in Holy Cross College affiliated to the Manonmaniam Sundaranar University for a period of not less than three academic years (six semesters), passed the prescribed examinations and fulfilled such conditions as have been prescribed thereof.

2. Duration

The Programme is for a period of three years. Each academic year shall comprise of two Semesters viz. Odd and Even semesters. Odd Semester shall be from June to October / November and Even Semester shall be from November /

December to April. There shall be not less than 90 working days which comprise of 450 teaching clock hours for each Semester (excluding the days for the conduct of end-semester examinations).

3. CBCS System

The main feature of the CBCS is to make undergraduate education student-centric allowing students to choose interdisciplinary, intra-disciplinary and skill-oriented courses (even from other disciplines according to their learning needs, interests and attitude) with optimal flexibility for students on par with global standards.

4. Courses

Part I - Language Courses - Tamil and French

Part II - General English

Part III - Major Core Courses, Major Core Practicals, Elective Courses, Allied Courses,

Allied Practicals and Major Project / Major-Based Elective Courses.

Part IV- Add on Course —Professional English: Add on Course in Professional English is offered to all the students in the I, II, III and IV Semesters. (2 hours-2 credits).

- 1. Professional English for Physical Sciences is offered to the students of the Departments of Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, and Computer Science.
- **2. Professional English for Life Sciences** is offered to the students of the Departments of Botany and Zoology.
- **3. Professional English for Arts and Social Sciences** is offered to the students of the Departments of History, Economics, English and Tamil.
- **4. Professional English for Commerce and Management** is offered to the students of the Department of Commerce.

Part IV-Non-Major Elective: Interdisciplinary Course in Semester – I & II (2 hours-2 credits)

- i) Basic Tamil: Those who have not studied Tamil upto XII Std, but have taken French under Part I shall take Basic Tamil comprising of two courses.
- **ii)** Advanced Tamil: Those who have studied Tamil upto XII Std but have taken French under Part I shall take Advanced Tamil comprising of two courses.
- iii) Others: Those who do not come under categories i) &ii) can choose any non major elective, comprising of two courses.
 - Part IV—Skill Enhancement Course (SEC): Mediation and Exercise / Computer Literacy: Students are divided into two categories wherein Category A have Yoga and Category B have Computer Literacy in Semester I and vice-versa in Semester II. (2+2 hours 2+2 credits).
- i) Category A: Computer Science, English (Aided & SF), Zoology, History, Chemistry, Tamil (SF).
- ii) Category B: Commerce (Aided & SF), Mathematics (Aided & SF), Botany, Physics and Economics.
 - **Part IV-Skill Enhancement Course (SEC):** Major-Based Course in Semester VI (2 hours 2 credits).
 - Part IV-Ability Enhancement Course (AEC): Environmental Studies is offered in Semester V for all UG students (2 hours 2 credits).
 - **Part V- Foundation Course I: Values for Life** is offered in Semester I & II for all UG students (1 credit).
 - **Part V- Foundation Course II: Personality Development** is offered in Semester III & IV for all UG students (1 credit).
 - Part V- Foundation Course III: Human Rights Education (HRE) is offered in Semester V for all UG students (1 credit).
 - Part V- Foundation Course IV: Gender Equity Studies (GES) is offered in Semester VI for all UG students (1 credit).
 - Part V- Service Learning Programme (SLP): Community Engagement Course is offered in Semester II & III for all UG students for 30 hours with 50% field work (2 credits).

PartV-Service Learning Programme (SLP): Reaching the Unreached Neighbourhood (RUN) programme is offered in the III & IV Semesters. (2 credits).

ii) Degree

The candidates shall have subsequently undergone the prescribed Programme of study in Holy Cross College affiliated to the Manonmaniam Sundaranar University for a period of not less than two academic years comprising four semesters, passed the examinations prescribed and fulfilled such conditions as have been prescribed there of.

2. Duration

The duration of PG Programme is for a period of two years. Each academic year shall comprise of two semesters, viz. Odd and Even semesters. Odd semester shall be from June to October / November and even semester shall be from November / December to April. There shall not be less than 90 working days which comprise of 450 teaching clock hours for each semester (excluding the days for the conduct of end-semester examinations).

3. Semesters

In each semester, courses are offered in 15 teaching weeks

and the remaining 5 weeks are to be utilized for the conduct of examinations and evaluation purposes. Each week shall have 30 working hours spread over 5 / 6 days a week.

4. CBCS System

The main feature of the CBCS is to make post graduate education student-centric allowing students to choose inter-disciplinary, intra-disciplinary courses, skill-oriented courses(even from other disciplines according to their learning needs, interests and attitude) with optimal flexibility for students on par with global standards.

In keeping with the spirit of CBCS based on the norms of UGC, the curriculum has been restructured once in every three years since the college was conferred with the autonomous status in 2007- 2008.

A PG student may take up an Internship/ Summer Training Programme relevant to her subject in any reputed institution for a period of minimum 30 hours in order to develop knowledge and skills and equip for career. This programme was included within the curriculum with one credit under curriculum restructuring from 2011-12.

As per the guidelines from UGC, Community Engagement Course is offered to all the I PG students with 2 credits for 30 hours with at least 50% field experience.

5. Courses

The following are the various categories of courses offered in the PG programmes:

Arts and Commerce - Core Courses, Elective Courses & Project

Science - Core Courses, Core Practical, Elective Courses & Project.

The college provides all information to students regarding Elective Courses so as to enable them to choose the relevant ones.

Project - Each candidate shall be required to take up a project (2 members in each group) and submit the project report at the end of the third semester. The Head of the Department

shall assign the Guide who, inturn, will suggest the Project Work to the student in the beginning of the final year. A copy of the project report will be submitted to the Department before the date fixed by the Institution. The Project will be evaluated by an internal and an external examiner nominated by the Controller of Examinations. The candidate will have to defend her Project through a Viva-voce.

Life Skill Training I & II – Life Skill Training is offered to the PG students to mould them to responsible individuals. External Examination is conducted at the end of the II & IV Semesters (1 credit each).

Service-Learning Programme (SLP)-Community Engagement Course with two credits for 30 hours with at least 50% in the field, is compulsory for all PG students (2 credits).

Summer Training Programme-Minimum 30 hours Programme with one credit is mandatory for all I PG students to undertake at the end of semester II.

External Examination and Valuation

- O Students can apply through online for semester examination.
- Hall tickets can be downloaded from College website prior to the examination.
- O Semester examination will be for 3 hours, conducted at the end of the semester, by the Controller of Examination. Double valuation system is followed for PG courses.
- O If the difference between the two valuations exceeds 15 marks, the Controller of Examinations may recommend for a third valuation by another external examiner.
- The Controller of Examination will issue the notification

- announcing the commencement of examination, submission of filled in application form and the examination fee to be paid.
- O The time table for semester examination will be published by the Controller of Examination two weeks prior to the date of commencement of examinations.

Results, Revaluation, Reappearance and Supplementary Examinations-Minimum Pass Percentage

For UG students, a minimum of 40% in the external examination and an aggregate of 40% is required. For PG students and M.Phil Scholars a minimum of 50% in the external examination and aggregate of 50% is required. There is no minimum pass percentage for the CIA.

Results

After the valuation of papers, the results will be scrutinized by the Award Committee and then published.

Students will receive the results on their mobile through SMS. They can also view them online - erp.holycrossngl.edu.in. Students will be given a mark sheet for every semester examination. At the end of the course, a consolidated mark sheet of the final results based on Grade Point Average is awarded to each student.

Revaluation

Revaluation is permitted only for regular examinations for the UG courses and not for arrears and Part IV Courses and this is done only after payment of the prescribed fee at the stipulated time. Fee prescribed according to the rules currently in force in the college will have to be paid. Concerning the results of the revaluation, if the revalued mark is higher than the original mark, then the former will be recorded as the final mark. If not the original mark will be retained. Xerox copies of the exam papers can be obtained from COE and verified.

Reappearance for Arrear Course

Students can take up arrear examinations along with the subsequent regular end semester examinations. The candidates

with arrears will be permitted to appear for the arrear examinations in the same syllabus for a period of 3 years from the year of normal completion of the same course (for UG 3+3 years and for PG 2+3 years) failing which they have to appear for the courses in the latest syllabus prescribed for the course. If no course is available in the same title, then the candidates shall appear for the arrear courses that are prescribed to be equivalent by the Chairperson/ Board of Studies/ Controller of Examination and HOD concerned.

Reappearance for Theory Papers

Students are permitted to write their arrear papers in all the subsequent semesters.

Supplementary Examination for Final Semester

For the outgoing students a supplementary examination will be conducted within ten days after the semester examination results, to help them to get their degrees without delay. UG students who have no arrears upto fifth semester and II PG students who have no arrears upto third semester are allowed to write the supplementary examination. UG and PG students can appear for only two arrears in the supplementary examination. The question paper pattern for supplementary examination will be the same as the regular examination for each subject. Candidates, who are writing the supplementary examination are required to submit the filled in application form and pay the examination fee as specified.

Grievance Appeal Committee

In case of grievance of any nature, including those concerning the CIA, students can appeal to the Grievance Appeal Committee. The appeal should be addressed to the Principal who is the Chairperson of the committee.

A student, if dissatisfied with her marks, has the right to appeal

for a review of her marks in the CIA test (formative assessment) as per the procedure detailed below:

- a. Such appeals should be made to the course teacher(s) immediately after receiving the valued scripts.
- b. If additional clarification is necessary, the student should approach the Head of the Department concerned. The HOD will try to sort out the problem and initiate all efforts to settle the matter amicably.
- c. If not satisfied with (a) and (b) the student shall, within 3 days, make a written appeal to the Principal through the HOD/ Controller of Examination who will forward the same to the Grievance Appeal Committee for further review. The decision of the Grievance Appeal Committee shall be the final.

Semester Examination Question Papers

Any complaint with respect to the semester examination question paper must be brought to the notice of the Controller of Examinations on the day of examination within an hour after the commencement of the examination by the staff in-charge of that paper or by the HOD concerned. In the absence of HOD, the next senior teacher would take up this responsibility.

Condonation

A candidate must earn 75% of attendance per semester to take the semester examination. Candidates who have less than 75% of attendance but above 62% shall make a written request for condonation of attendance to the Principal one week prior to the last working day of the semester. Request for condonation of attendance will be considered by the Principal in consultation with the Head of the Department. In case of prolonged illness, request for condonation of attendance should be supported by a valid medical report from a Registered Medical Practitioner. If granted condonation, the students have to remit a condonation fee to take the semester examinations. Students having



attendance of less than 62% should repeat the missed semester and then continue the remaining semesters.

No Dues

Clearance of fee dues is a pre-requisite for

- 1. Issue of Hall ticket for the semester examination.
- 2. Getting Transfer Certificate from the college.

CO-CURRICULAR, EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES AND FACILITIES

Learning Enhancement Measures

I UG students are initially given Bridge course in English, named as **Take off with spoken English**. It is designed and conducted by the department of English along with volunteers from each department.

Communicative English classes are conducted by the respective subject teachers for all the UG students two hours per week. The course includes Reading, Writing, Listening and Speaking skills along with interview techniques.

Remedial programme is offered to the low achievers twice a week. Peer teaching, tutorials, group work and demonstration of practical are some of the means of conducting the remedial programme.

Mentor-ward system

To be of support to the students towards their academic excellence, social responsibility, to guide them to achieve their goal and to help them choose a relevant subject for their project and future career, the mentor-ward system has been implemented in the institution.

Internet E-mail services

Holy Cross College has an official website www.holycrossngl.edu.in. The research centres and Library are provided with internet. A computer centre, with 50 computers and internet facilities, serves staff and students. Intranet is also available for providing easy access between the departments and the Principal and Secretary.

Language Laboratory

Language laboratory is provided with 40 computers. Language Lab. is used for the conduct of the course 'English Communication'.

Instrumentation Centre (DST-FIST)

Common Instrumentation centre came to existence with the support of DST in 2013. So in addition to the research equipments available in Zoology, Physics, Chemistry and Botany Research laboratories, additional equipments such as FTIR, lyophilizer auto

Central Bank of India, Roch Nager Branch

The Central Bank of India is operating a branch within the campus exclusively for the benefit of the staff and students. The working time is 10.00 am to 4.00 pm. Students can open an account in their names and learn to make use of the banking facilities.

Sports and Games

Infrastructure facilities are provided to sports students . The national and state level players are given freeships by the institution to stay in the college hostel. Regular practice is given by inviting the coaches for activities like football, basket ball, volley ball, ball badminton, chess etc. Indoor stadium and gym are available for the physical fitness of the students.

Hostel

Hostel is a home away from home. There are around 250 students in the hostel managed by 3 wardens. The hostellers are given spiritual animation, personality development classes, social awareness programmes. Recreational facilities, TV and Audio visual aids and Daily Newspapers are provided. STD and Internet facilities are available in the hostel. Welcome day, Christmas, Farewell day are celebrated with great vigour and enthusiasm.

Admission to the college is not a guarantee for admission in the hostel.

Counseling Services

Trained counselors are available to help students with academic issues, family problems and also offers guidance for building up of self esteem and dignity.

Campus Ministry

This cell organizes retreats, inspirational talks and para liturgical services. Holy mass is organized at the beginning and end of the academic year besides Ash Wednesday for the catholic staff and students.

Value Education Books for UG and PG students are prepared by this team.

College Choir

Interested students join the college choir and they are trained to sing for all church services.

Student Information Cell

Information related to the facilities and services available in the college such as counseling, scholarships, mark statements, arrear exam details, attendance/absence, leave forms and certificates are provided by the Student information cell. Teaching and non - teaching staff are the members of the cell.

SC/ST Cell

The cell was launched to empower the students to live a dignified life. Seminars and motivation talks are arranged to enhance their leadership skills, life-managing skills and communicative skills. They are also guided by the faculty to avail of scholarships.

College Student Council and Quality Circle

College student Council consists of the President, Vice President, Secretary and the Joint Secretary who are elected annually by a secret ballot in a very democratic way at the beginning of every academic year. The student council and the class representatives constitute the Quality circle. The Dean of Students is the Staff Co-ordinator. The Students council members act as the link between the students and the Management of the College. Relevant and important problems and suggestions of the students are passed on to the Principal through the Quality circle. Teacher's Day, Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, Christmas, Pongal are organized by the Students in collaboration with the Deans of Student Affairs.

Alumnae Association

All the students who have studied in Holy Cross College, Nagercoil are encouraged to be the members of this Association. The annual Alumnae meeting is held on the second Saturday of August every year. Alumnae have contributed for the construction of the Multipurpose Hall and also for the Jubilee Hall. Every year they give the feedback and suggestions related to the academic and administrative affairs of the institution.

Parent Teachers Association

The Forum meets twice a semester and suggests measures to improve the quality of Education and Infrastructure facilities of the institution. The members support and involve in the integral development of the students

Honouring the Retirees

In order to recognize the service put in by the retired teachers, a committee has been formed in 2006-'07. The activities of the committee are:

- To invite the retirees for Christmas celebration, Retirement function, Ph.D. Viva-voce examinations and other special occasions.
- To form a whatsapp group and inform them about the events (Marriage, Death, celebrations and functions) related to the college.
- iii. To send Christmas/New year greeting for greater bonding.

Divyanjan Cell

To encourage and empower the differently abled students of the institution, the cell has been formed in 2018-2019. Some of the activities of the cell are:

- i. To get the disability identity card for the students.
- ii. To make them aware of the welfare schemes through the officials of the Social Welfare Department of the district.

- iii. To motivate them to register in the employment office in Chennai.
- iv. To arrange for need based counselling.
- v. To organize programmes to empower them.

Crossian Centre for Research and Development

The Crossian Centre for Research boosts the quality research in the institution. The Crossian Research Forum which includes all the faculty members co-ordinates all the research activities of this forum.

Research Committee

The Research of the committee is constituted of one member from each department. The members releases the interdisciplinary biannual journal "Crossian Resonance" twice a year. They organize seminars/workshops relevant to the current trends in research and encourages the members of the faculty to involve actively in research activities. Research data base containing details of research projects, publications, participation in seminars, awards and major and minor projects availed by the departments is collected from each department and submit to the IQAC of the college every year.

Intellectual Properly Right (IPR) Cell

The cell is responsible for the implementation of the policy on research and consultancy.

They plan and take necessary steps to get copy right for innovative original work and patent right for their finding. They give the guidelines to publish research articles in journals with high impact factor that are well recognized by global researchers. They work out MoUs, linkages and collaboration with other prominent research institutes/industries within the country and also outside. They administer the activities of the Instrumentation Centre and work out the possibilities of having consultancy through the centre.

Student Research Forum/Institutional Innovation Cell

The purpose of this forum is to create research aptitude in young researchers and organize motivation programmes to the interested students. The students construct/bring out innovative products and exhibit their potentials through exhibits.

Crossian Centre for Entrepreneur Development and Career Guidance

In order to motivate the students towards various career opportunities and mould them into effective entrepreneurs the Crossian Centre for Entrepreneur Development has been started.

Skill Development Committee

Skill development programme is mandatory for all the I UG students and is conducted by experts on Saturdays and local holidays. Skill based Certificate courses such as Clinical Chemistry, Journalism, Tailoring, Embroidery, Drawing, Painting, Handicraft, Beautician course, Jewel making using clay, paper and pearls etc. are taught to the interested students.

Innovation and Startups

The centre has been established in the institution in 2017-'18. The objective of the Centre is to groom students towards entrepreneurship, Research career and indicate startups. It offers a new echo system for the young entrepreneur.

Employment Information, Career Guidance and Placement Cell

Employment Information, Career Guidance and Placement Cell give information to the students on various employment opportunities through Public Announcing System and also leaflets. They organize meetings, awareness programmes on employment and also career opportunities. Resource persons from various training agencies such as IAS Academy, Bank coaching centres and centres of CA are invited to motivate the students.

Executive officers from IT companies and School Administration and Finance centres are invited for campus drive for Placement. Career counseling is provided through this cell.

Entrepreneur Development Cell

The students who are interested to become entrepreneurs are motivated and trained through the Entrepreneur development cell. Creative work on handicrafts, artificial jewel making, painting, tailoring & embroidery works are exhibited. The institution gives provision to those who want to market their art and skill, so that they may earn while they learn. It acts as an incubation centre for students with entrepreneur skills.

Entry Level Services

Aspiring students from among the I UG are given motivation on becoming IAS officers, Bank employees and Executives in Insurance companies. Periodical trainings, materials such as books and journals and computer with internet facilities are provided for them during working days and holidays. Students are also prepared to appear for the entrance exams related to Banks, civil services and other Government jobs.

Crossian Centre for Women's Studies

Being the first women's college in Kanyakumari district, the centre is concerned with the women's issues in the community; Women's studies is made mandatory for all the III UG students, workshops and seminars related to health, women's rights, exhibitions etc are conducted. Competitions on women's day are organized in collaboration with district women welfare Self Help Groups. Books, videos and journals pertaining to Gender equality and women empowerment are available in a separate section of the Central Library and also in the centre.

Crossian Centre for Environment Studies

Centre for Environment Studies is a legacy of the eco-conscious principles. Long before setting up of the Centre the college has maintained a green campus which emerges as the strength of the institution in every SWOT analysis. Besides co-ordinating the activities of the Eco Club, the centre monitors the Environmental Studies which is mandatory to all students. After the Ocki Cyclone, steps have been intensified to bring back the original bio-diversity campus.

Crossian Centre for Outreach Programmes

The college is keen on developing individuals who are socially committed. A number of outreach programmes are organized towards this purpose:

Youth Red Cross organizes blood donation camp, free medical camp, awareness programmes etc.

NSS develops National consciousness among students. The two units conduct: an annual camp (which teaches the dignity of labour and challenges of life), rallies, awareness programmes etc..

Red Ribbon Club is involved in the service of those affected by AIDS. Collaborating with the NGO, the MSW students raise funds to assist HIV positive children.

Consumer Club educates students on the Consumer Protection Act of 1986. In turn students educate the public along with the District Consumer Forum.

Human Rights Unit/Legal Literacy Committee to inculcate a sense of human rights for benefitting the individual and the society. The unit has made compulsory the Human Rights course for all third year students besides organising seminars and observation visits to the district court.

All India Catholic University Federation (AICUF) aims at empowering the youth. Community outreach programme during Christmas and leadership training are arranged.

Rotaract Club proactively involves in socially beneficiary programmes like blood donation camp, medical camps etc.

Reaching the Unreached Neighbourhood (RUN)

RUN Programme started in 2007 is a compulsory programme for all second year undergraduates. Visits are undertaken to villages, schools, home for the aged and so on as part of the 60 hour activity that instills socially committed approach to life.

Childline

Since 2011, the institution serves as a nodal centre for Childline, India. It spearheads the awareness programmes with the help of professionals and students. The campaign seeks to be active in the neighbouring areas.


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
